<p>4:00 – 5:45 pm</p>	<p><b>Session 4: The Protection of Migrants’ Social Rights in Unconsolidated Social States and States with High Poverty Levels</b></p> <p>In unconsolidated social states, the full satisfaction of social rights, such as the right to health, education, and work, continue to be a challenge, with the lack of protection sometimes sinking to the minimum levels required for each right. In these circumstances, the arrival of migrants poses an even greater challenge in satisfying migrants’ social rights, as well as a situation of constitutional tension with regard to the social rights of citizens, particularly those groups who face higher levels of vulnerability.
